Greed (2003) has emphasized on toilet provision should be for everyone not only for people with disabilities or the incontinent.




Figure 1.1: Various categories of Public Toilet users.

general, universal In emphasizes the design proactive integration of accessibility and usability products and to environments as fundamental constructs of design itself.




Figure 1.2: Concept of universal design is for all people (Source: http://www.oki.com/en/csr/csract/customer/ud.html)

TOILET DESIGN ACCORDING TO THE ISLAMIC PRINCIPLES

1) Entering

• The Qur'an states that one should enter the restroom with left foot first while saying a prayer of protection. It is not permissible to enter a restroom while carrying anything that bears the name of Allah.

4) Squatting/Sitting

 Muslims are encouraged to urinate while sitting or squatting and not while standing since this was the usual practice of the Prophet. it is healthier for the body and there is less chance of urine splashing onto one's body or clothes.

3) Prohibition Facing the Qiblah

• From the Islamic perspective, it is necessary to establish the direction of qiblah first before locating and designing a toilet.

2) Seclusion

• Privacy is therefore a major requirement when providing restroom facilities for Muslim users

5) Cleaning

• After using the toilet, one should perform the Istinjaa (cleansing with water). In Istinjaa, water is preferred for the purpose of cleaning oneself

6) Stepping Out

• Muslims have a practice of leaving the toilet with right foot first as this is the usual practice of the Prophet.


Figure 1.4 Male, female, cleaners' room and accessible toilet - Layout plan (Source: MS 2015: PART1)


