






# Whittlesea Disability Action Plan (DAP)

- Plan to increase accessible housing options





# Making it mainstream: incentivise the model



### **Planning Policy**

 Strategic Evidence to support policy change.

#### Housing diversity strategies

Encourage a greater diversity of housing types and dwelling size including both smaller and larger dwellings.

Encourage accessible and adaptable housing that includes dwellings:

- Containing a kitchen, bedroom, shower, toilet and wash basin at ground level that is usable by everyone regardless of their age and abilities.
- In areas close to rail and tram services, and commercial and community services.

#### Housing diversity policy guideline

Consider as relevant:

Accessible and adaptable housing at a rate of 1 for every 10 dwellings in a development of 10 dwellings or more.

#### **Planning decisions**

- Voluntary Agreements (Social and Affordable Housing).
- Priority Application Process.
- Discretionary ambit (parking, density).
